A Little Place

"Father, where shall I work today?" And my love flowed warm and free. Then He pointed me out a tiny spot And said, "Tend that for Me." I answered quickly, "Oh no, not there, Why, no one would ever see No matter how well my work was done. Not a little place for me!" And the word He spoke, it was not stern. He answered me tenderly: "Ah, little one, search that heart of thine, Art thou working for them or Me? Nazareth was a little place. And so was Galilee."

Both Active and Contemplative

õThe report went around concerning Him all the more; and great multitudes came together to hear, and to be healed by Him of their infirmities. So He Himself often withdrew into the wilderness and prayedö (Luke 5:15,16).

COMPARING THE CHRISTIAN LIFE TO A MELODY, THERE ARE TWO KEYS THE MELODY CAN BE PLAYED IN: ACTIVE AND CONTEMPLATIVE. Some Christians tend in the direction of active service while others tend toward quiet devotion. Neither is inherently wrong; there is a need for both. We should be cautious before criticizing someone for not doing discipleship exactly as we do it.

In the life of Jesus and His apostles, we see some times of activity and other times of quietness. õThen the apostles gathered to Jesus and told Him all things, both what they had done and what they had taught. And He said to them, -Come aside by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while.øFor there were many coming and going, and they did not even have time to eatö (Mark 6:30,31). Just so, the life of the individual Christian will move through different periods, some more active and some more contemplative.

But what about the Lordøs church? Is there not room in the kingdom for individuals whose overall lives tend more in one direction than the other? The answer should be an obvious õYes!ö The body needs all, and we all need each other. As Paul warned, õThe eye cannot say to the hand, 4 have no need of you'; nor again the head to the feet, 4 have no need of you'ö (1 Corinthians 12:21).

If Jøm a more active Christian and youøre more contemplative, I need your example to remind me to take time for spiritual refreshment. And if Jøm more contemplative and youøre more active, I need your example to remind me that Christianity is about more than just õmy God and I.ö Together weøre stronger than we would be without the influence of the other, and we should be careful not to criticize or minimize the other. Neither of us has a personality or style of service that is inherently superior to others. And arguing over whoøs putting the emphasis where itøs most needed is little more than a waste of time. None of us, all by ourselves, will get the emphasis right ô itøs *together* that the Lordøs work gets done.
