The "Me-ism" of Deism

Said the deist to his God, "Thank you for this magnificent, beautifully intricate world You have provided for me: now have a seat, and I will take it from here except for when I really need You."

Reducing our all-powerful Creator to a clockmaker or a tinkerer is dangerous, myopic, selfish and easy. Many Christians publicly espouse that God is everywhere, yet privately seem to gravitate toward the mindset that He resides only in heaven, perched atop our perceived systems of space and time, and rarely, if ever, makes a trip to this world He gave us. Our God does not need to "make trips."

God is. He exists at all times, in all places, on every plane of reality, physics and metaphysics. He is connected to all dimensions we have discovered or He put them there or as well as those we yet know not.

Often, we Christians don't quite seem to comprehend the "omni" in omnipresent. Our God defies our understanding of the physical world and its inner- and outer workings or the world He created and temporarily gave us, mind you. Our earthly knowledge belies the truth we have come to believe. Faith is organic, systemic, holistic, yet we allow our nearsighted, feeble, factual constructs of things scientific to dictate where God is.

People, by nature, are self-centered. This does not necessarily mean arrogant or narcissistic; it simply means that we base our knowledge of all things on our own perspective. When we are the center, we never have to wander far from our point of understanding. We would rather feel that we always "get it" than to feel the cognitive (or spiritual) dissonance that inherently accompanies growth, expansion and maturity. Therefore we leave God where it is safe to leave Him: detached from us, beyond the curtain that divides heaven and earth. We approach Him when we see fit, and then we leave Him there when we come back down to earth, telling Him we will be back to visit soon.

How can we pray to our God for action all the while believing He is just an observer? How can we talk with our Lord when we keep Him locked in heaven? Heaven is not ours to lock, nor is God ours to summon. We are His creation, His people, His property. Until we flip the reality of our perceptions and acknowledge that our worldly "wisdom" is wholly insufficient, we will never fully know or appreciate the God who lets us live on this earth and fills all places or yes even the secret ones or at all times.
