How long should it take for a non-Christian to learn the plan of salvation and be baptized? Most of us think a few hours should be sufficient because there are dangers in waiting too long: death of the candidate, serious incapacitating illness, loss of interest. But one retired Lipscomb teacher waited 18 years for a former student to be baptized into Christ.

In 1978, a young man, just hours after arriving in the U.S. from his native Middle Eastern home, was brought by a relative to the teacher's office with a plea that he help this boy adjust to a different language and culture. The teacher, an instructor in Bible and English, gladly accepted the request. The student, during the next four years, enrolled in every class this teacher offered and made excellent grades.

Although the Bible was completely new to this student, by listening carefully in class and reviewing the teacher's notes, he was able to give correct answers on every test. The gospel was thoroughly taught thusly. The student graciously declined to act upon what he had been taught, graduated, and later earned a master's degree and doctorate from other universities. Personal contact was never lost between the two now very dear friends.

As the years passed, no pressure for the student to change his religion was exerted, but genuine concern was always in evidence, as was respect for the teacher.

Eventually, during his annual New Year's call, the student said that he considered himself a true Christian, having repudiated his former religion. The teacher asked if the student had ever been baptized. The answer was "No. I feel quite comfortable without it." The teacher gave him a list of references on baptism, still not exerting pressure for compliance but knowing the respect the student now had for the Bible.

In a matter of days, the student called again, saying he was ready to be baptized and asking what he should do. (He had not attended any church in all the years since leaving Lipscomb.) The teacher said a preacher in his city would be contacted to baptize him. After a long silence, the student said, "But I had wanted you to baptize me." Although the distance between the two friends was more than 2,000 miles, the teacher quickly agreed to baptize his dear friend.

Why did the teacher not exert pressure for obedience sooner? The truth of the Bible had to be tested and tried by the student so as to change his view completely. Such drastic changes take time and patience, but the rewards are well worth the wait.
