### This and That

Doctrine. What is it? Where is it found? Is it important? These questions beg for an answer. Rather than be indifferent to doctrine we should be diligent enough to answer these questions.

First of all, doctrine is defined as *teaching*. That answers the 1st question, what is it? We are taught many things as we grow up and into adulthood. So far as this article is concerned, we are talking of the teachings of Jesus. Mark 4:2 õAnd he taught them many things by parables, and said unto them in his doctrineí ö

Where is it found? In John 7:16, Jesus made the following statement: õMy doctrine is not mine, but his that sent me.ö This indicates that his teachings are found in Godøs word.

Is it important? The 1<sup>st</sup> disciples continued steadfastly in it, Acts 2:42. The Romans obeyed it from the heart, Romans 6:16. Paul told Timothy to give attention to doctrine, continue in the doctrine, and the scriptures given by Godøs inspiration contain the doctrine, 1 and 2 Timothy. It was said many years ago that we preached too much *doctrinal* gospel. By this it was meant that we stressed (argued for) church scriptures, Godly living, discipline, and fundamental truths too much. Folks, it looks like we ought to get back to that, for it was such that made the church strong and available for our generation. *D. Newell* 

õThere is no right without a parallel duty, no liberty without the supremacy of law, no high destiny without earnest perseverance, no greatness without self-denialö (Francis Lieber).

DOING OUR ÕDUTYÖ PROBABLY SOUNDS LIKE A DREARY CHORE, BUT PROPERLY CONCEIVED, OUR DUTIES ARE AMONG OUR HIGHEST PRIVILEGES. And in a culture where freedom often pushes duty aside, we need to be reminded of the need for duty. Without a sense of duty, our freedoms will soon get away from us.

Most of us engage in what T. S. Eliot called the õendless struggleö to think well of ourselves. We want ô in fact, we need ô to be able to see ourselves in a favorable light. But how can we do that? There is only one way, really, and that is by paying serious attention to our conscience and doing our duty. Goethe was exactly right: õHow shall we learn to know ourselves? By reflection? Never, but only through action. Strive to do your duty, and you will know what is in you.ö

There is no better gift we can give to our loved ones than to discharge our responsibilities faithfully, not only to them but also to others. When people know that we can be trusted to do what we should, no matter what, then their relationship with us is surrounded and supported by trust. Not needing to wonder what we might do (or not do), our family and friends can relax in their relationship with us.

Chauncey Wright wrote, õWhat a fearful object a longneglected duty gets to be.ö I agree. There is nothing so tiring as the constant hanging on of some responsibility that weeve been putting off. If you have ever finally stepped up to a duty and done something that you had been procrastinating for a long time, you know the wonderful feeling of freedom that results. So there is much to be said not only for doing what we should, but for doing it in a timely fashion: today!

On special occasions, duty can be a õbigö thing, but more often it is ordinary. It consists of doing the many õlittleö things that each dayøs work places before us. So if you think you can default on your daily duties but still have the character to do what is right when the big occasion arrives and you are in the spotlight, you are sadly mistaken.
